The Guilford Township Supervisors approved resolutions and the dedication of Hot Springs Court, a portion of St. Annes Drive and a portion of Sandwich Lane. The Supervisors also agreed to the placement of speed warning lights at Bent Oak Drive/Oak Leaf Lane to remind residents traveling along the streets of the 25 MPH posted speed limit.

Last year I approached the Supervisors at the request of residents on Cascades Drive as to how Side Road Intersection warning signs could be placed along State Road 2031 (Mont Alto Road) to make motorists aware of the Cascades Drive entrance. 

The weather didn't cooperate with the January Food Pantry pickup so we had to cancel.


Our next Food Pantry pickup will be Tuesday, February 4th. Please have your donations at the end of your driveway by 9am for drivers to pick up.



House numbers on your house are not always visible at night from the road, and during an emergency, where seconds may matter, a reflective sign may mean the difference between life and death.

FRANKLIN COUNTY SERVICE TO SAFEGUARD PROPERTY OWNERS

Franklin County has implemented a new record alert notification system as a safeguard for property owners. This program is free of charge and was implemented to help ease the minds of Franklin County property owners in response to a notable rise in fraud and crime involving property titles all across the county. With this new tool, if you register, you will be alerted to anything that may be put on your property record. In order to register you will need your property's county-assigned 20 character Tax Parcel Identification Number. This number can be found on your tax bills or by visiting the county website (see below) under UPI public lookup website with tax information.



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PENN STATE MASTER GARDNER DEMONSTRATION GARDENS

Did you know that the Penn State Extension Master Gardeners maintain demonstration gardens on the east side of Franklin Farm Lane in Chambersburg? They do! The gardens are open to the public dawn to dusk every day. You may think there's not much to see at this time of year, but you would be wrong.

Walking along the path in the Wildlife Garden you'll see evergreens with cones, Northern Oats swaying in the breeze, and the fluffy seed heads of goldenrod all creating lovely contrasts against the winter backdrop. There may be a few remaining milkweed plants with the seeds waiting to fly free.

In the Pollinator Garden, fall clean-up left some leaf litter where butterflies such as Red Admiral (Vanessa atalanta) overwinter in their cocoons and short hollow stems of pruned flowers are a place for overwintering native bees. The Drought Tolerant Garden highlights quite a few evergreens, and the Victory Garden has been cleaned for the winter. Stems and some leaves also remain in the Perennial Garden. Lavender and winter savory are still standing in the Herb Garden while most of the plants have gone dormant for the winter. Black Swallowtail butterflies (Papilio polyxenes), that have feasted on the dill, parsley, and fennel all summer, are in their cocoons: waiting for spring.

The Gass (Gause) Garden, celebrating the life of Patrick Gass, is across the lane at the Extension Office entrance. The long granite wall with crevices provides shelter for small mammals. There are shrubs with berries for the birds. There is also a Little Library in this garden where free books are available and where horticulture themed books may be left for others.

Look for Master Gardener special events during the year at the gardens and save May 17 for the annual Plant Sale.
