## 2025 MIXED LEAGUE

The Penn National Mixed League is designed to bring neighbors together in a social setting for a friendly round of golf followed by a get-together to discuss the round, meet with neighbors, and enjoy happy hour. This is a mixed league and not necessarily a couple's league – open to everyone! League play starts in early April and is played every other Friday into the fall. This year, Mixed League will start on April 11th with a 4-person scramble. Membership in the Mixed League is very simple – there is no membership fee and no commitment; you just need to belong to a USGA handicap system. Please note that for the first event on April 11th, everyone is welcome – you do not need a handicap.

You sign up for our email list and you'll be added to the signup spread sheet, and you will get notifications of the tee times and games for each event. We have team games each week designed for friendly competition between golfers of all skill levels, generally playing off the tee of your choice using handicaps to level the competitions. Teams will be randomly selected with a mix of men and women on each team. Although there's no cost to join the league, each player pays \$3 a round. The pot is split among the winning teams at the end of the round. We gather on the terrace after the round to reward team winners and enjoy camaraderie and happy hour together.

This year, we plan to have several 9 holes events in the evening on non-mixed league weeks. Dates to be announced.



#### PENN NEEDLES QUILTERS

Did you know, March 8th is National Quilting Day. It is also National Women's Month so let's remember our past a moment.

The first detailed accounts of quilting dates back to the 17th century in Colonial America out of necessity. Conestoga wagons and rough-hewn homes needed something to cover all those drafts to protect family from the elements. Women cleverly hand sewed any fabric of sorts to protect their family.

In the 18th century, women of means started Colonial Quilts with decorative stitches, it became a hobby. In the 1840's, with an expanding textile industry, American women began to express their creativity through quilting. Next came quilting bees to help tackle loneliness that pioneers, in rural areas, faced in isolated areas. It may have been a grand parlour or a cramped bedroom in a log home with a wooden frame, with 2-7 women working together producing quilts to fundraise for war efforts. These were the most expensive items made, and the money went toward buying supplies and 3 gunboats in WWI.

During the Civil War, family quilts were donated to soldiers and women began to create quilts 7 feet by 3 feet to fit military beds made from any fabric available. By the end of the war 250,000 quilts were made for soldiers. From that era came Crazy Quilts, WWII & rationing including fabric, 1960's resurgence of quilting mostly still made by hand, 1970's newfound created guilds, 1980s new tools like rotary cutters & mats making quilting easier and more efficient. Today we have high-tech sewing machines that help create elaborate designs in hours instead of weeks.

Talk about girl power!

Our February 18th meeting was attended by 31 ladies. Co-Coordinator, Frances Badman led us through the reports of committees. We had 2 informative classes. Norma Huss demonstrated English Paper Piecing & Gloria Winkleman described techniques for 'Jacob's Ladder'. We then tied 4 bed sized quilts and more than 50 utility bags for the Mennonite Relief Center. Sit N Sew was well attended to work on our commitment of Reading Pillows.

#### RECOMMENDED READS FROM OUR BOOK CLUBS

From Literary Ladies Book Club

- Ordinary Grace by William Kent Krueger is The story of a young boy growing up in the Midwest with a preacher father, mother and siblings. The family faces tragedy one summer with multiple deaths in their community. How the family deals with these tragedies with the blessing of ordinary grace is quite extraordinary.
- The One Hundred Years of Lenni and Margot by Marianne Cronin. Lenni, a teenager, and Margot, in her 80's, are both confined to a hospital for vastly different reasons. While there, they meet in art class and develop a mutual understanding of each other's plight. They decide to stage an art exhibit commemorating the 100 years of their added lives. Through their journey they both grow in unexpected ways and come to understand the journey life has taken them on thus far, as well as what life has in store for them. 


